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A significant contribution to female receptions of Greek tragedy in nineteenth English literature, exploring George Eliot's classical literacy and how it shapes the female protagonists in her novels, *Romola* and *Middlemarch*. It argues that instead of depicting male heroic monumentality, Eliot draws on tragedy to elicit the commonplace tragedies of everyday women.
